We can anticipate Harvest Thanksgiving, a special Remembrance Day, when Armistice, the end of WW1 falls on Sunday Nov 11th. There's no doubt we all like the cycle of the year, and its milestones month by month, and often this attitude can creep into our life of faith too. It's a bleak picture I draw, but it isn't inevitable. The Gospel of our Saviour is as relevant to AD 2018 as it was to AD 1. It's life, and people are looking for life. They need to see it, in Christian people, in congregations, in everyday church life. They need to see Jesus! Let's show them him, the pearl of great price.
